Reports of City Officials

City Manager's Report –

- Coronavirus State and Local Recovery Funds (CSLFRF) applications for small business recovery funds are available on the City of Auburn webpage. Eligible expense categories include grants to mitigate financial hardship, rehabilitation of commercial properties or other improvements, business incubators, and start up or expansion assistance, and enhanced support to microbusinesses. There is a maximum of \$40,000 per applicant and applications are due April 30. The application process is on-line only. If potential applicants have questions or need assistance, they should contact Daniel Szabo at the Cayuga Economic Development Agency (CEDA). As of today we have received 5 completed applications and there are 18 in progress.
- Earlier this week Planning Staff and I met with representatives from Auburn Community Hospital to discuss neighborhood resident concerns about the impact of the proposed cancer treatment center on parking. The ACF staff indicated that as part of their due diligence and in response to these concerns they are having a parking study conducted to better understand and address neighborhood concerns.
- Last Thursday employees of the Verizon line and field service crew operation on Hardenburgh Ave. conducted a clean-up of the Mill St Dam area as part of their corporate community outreach efforts. They collected 20 bags of trash and one shopping cart.
- In anticipation of sewer, storm sewer, and road work to be conducted along East Hill, our Municipal Utilities department has begun reaching out to businesses in the area to assess their current and future needs. Work in the area will begin this spring and we intend to communicate frequently with local business and property owners to avoid issues and minimize the project's impact on daily operations.
- The city is currently accepting proposals for services related to the mandated safety inspection of Mill St. Dam. Proposals are due April 13.

RESOLUTION # 1 of 2022

DETERMINING THAT THE CASEY PARK SKATEPARK PROJECT IS AN UNLISTED ACTION AND WILL NOT HAVE A SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

WHEREAS, the City of Auburn (the "City") intends to improve and expand the City's existing skate park (the "Project"), located at Casey Park, 150 North Division Street, Auburn, New York; and

WHEREAS, the Project will include improvements such as removal of the existing skatepark equipment, excavation of existing asphalt, and installation of a new poured-in-place concrete skatepark; and

WHEREAS, the City intends to comply with the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and the implementing regulations set forth at 6 NYCRR Part 617 (the "Regulations") with respect to the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City has prepared and completed Parts 1, 2, and 3 of the Short Environmental Assessment Form ("EAF") for the Project, and compared the impacts that may reasonably be expected to result from the Project to the criteria for determining significance as identified in Section 617.7(c)(1) of the Regulations, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the significance of the potential environmental impacts of the Project and said review has resulted in a reasoned determination that the proposed action will NOT result in any large and important impacts(s) and, therefore, is one which will not have a significant negative impact on the environment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of Auburn that based upon an examination of the Short Environmental Assessment Form and other available supporting information, the knowledge about the area surrounding the Project, and such further investigation of the Project and its potential environmental impact, the City Council makes the following findings and determinations with respect to the Project:

- 1. The City Council hereby approves and adopts the Short Environmental Assessment Form for the Project (Parts 1-3 with its supporting written elaboration), which is attached hereto and incorporated herein;
- 2. The Project is hereby classified as an "Unlisted" action, as the quoted term is defined in the Regulations; and
- 3. The City hereby issues a Negative Declaration for the Project, and will not require the preparation of an environmental impact statement for the Project; and
- 4. That the City Clerk and City staff are authorized to take such additional steps as may be necessary to carry out this Resolution; and

5. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

AUTHORIZING CHANGE ORDER #1 TO CRANE-HOGAN STRUCTURAL SYSTEMS INC. FOR THE LINCOLN STREET PARKING GARAGE REHABILITATION PROJECT

WHEREAS, Change Order #1 in the amount of \$798,000 involving various structural and architectural improvements is now required to complete this project and extend the useful life of the parking garage; and

WHEREAS, the Change Order work will involve additional repairs and/or replacement of concrete flooring, re-bars, and tendons.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Auburn City Council does hereby award the Change Order #1 in the amount of \$798,000 to Crane-Hogan Structural Systems Inc. for the Lincoln Street Parking Garage Rehabilitation Project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cost of the Resolution in the total amount of \$798,000.00 is to be charged to the Welcome Center Project capital account #HA1620.440.IM; and

AGREEMENT RESOLUTION #36 OF 2022

AUTHORIZING CHANGE ORDER #3 TO POPLI DESIGN GROUP FOR THE NEW YORK STATE EQUAL RIGHTS HERITAGE CENTER PROJECT

WHEREAS, on April 8, 2021, the Auburn City Council authorized Agreement Resolution #46 of 2021, which awarded Popli Design Group Change Order #2 for professional services related to Construction Inspection Services for the Lincoln Street Parking Garage Improvements (the "Project") in the amount of \$150,000; and

WHEREAS, the City of Auburn was previously awarded \$10 million from the Upstate Revitalization Initiative towards the Project;

WHEREAS, the City has completed all of the construction of the NYS Equal Rights Heritage Center and finished all related property and highway improvements, except for those needed to complete the remaining capital improvements to the downtown parking garage, which serves as the visitor parking for the NYS Equal Rights Heritage Center; and

WHEREAS, Change Order #3 to the Agreement with Popli Design Group in the amount of \$40,000 is now required to cover additional professional services costs for construction work extending through September 1, 2022 for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the cost of this Resolution is to be charged to the Welcome Center capital account #HA 1620-440-IM in the amount of \$40,000 which is eligible for 100% reimbursement under the NYS Upstate Revitalization Initiative grant.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Auburn City Council does hereby award Change Order #3, in the amount of \$40,000 to Popli Design Group for additional professional services related to the Lincoln Street Parking Garage Improvements and the NYS Equal Rights Heritage Center Projects; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cost of this Resolution shall be charged to the Welcome Center capital account #HA 1620-440-IM; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor, or appointed designee, is hereby authorized to execute any and all necessary agreements and reimbursement requests on behalf of the City of Auburn for said Project.

COUNCIL RESOLUTION #37 of 2022

AUTHORIZING THE ADOPTION OF THE 2021 CAYUGA COUNTY, NEW YORK HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN UPDATE

WHEREAS, the City of Auburn within Cayuga County, New York has exposure to natural hazards that increase the risk to life, property, environment and the local economy; and

WHEREAS, pro-active mitigation of known hazards before a disaster event can reduce or eliminate long-term risk to life and property; and

WHEREAS, The Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 established new requirements for pre- and post-disaster hazard mitigation programs; and

WHEREAS, a coalition of Cayuga County municipalities including the City of Auburn was formed to pool resources and create consistent mitigation strategies throughout Cayuga County; and

WHEREAS, the coalition has completed a planning process that engages the public, assesses the risk and vulnerability of the impacts of natural hazards, develops a mitigation strategy, and creates a plan for implementing, evaluating and revising this strategy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Auburn <u>City Council</u> that the City of Auburn adopts in its entirety the 2021 <u>Cayuga County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update (the "Plan") as</u> this jurisdiction's Hazard Mitigation Plan and resolves to execute the actions identified in the Plan that pertain to the City of Auburn; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Auburn will use the adopted and approved portions of the Plan to guide pre-and-post disaster mitigation and coordinate strategies identified in the Plan with other planning programs and continue its support of the Mitigation Planning Committee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Auburn will promote and incorporate mitigation planning as a component of governmental operations and provide an update of the Plan in conjunction with the County no less than every five (5) years.

COUNCIL RESOLUTION #38 of 2022

ADOPTING THE RETAIL WATER RATE

WHEREAS, a rate study was completed by GHD and the Department of Municipal Utilities in the spring of 2021 and a new rate structure was determined; and

WHEREAS, in the fiscal year 2021-2022 no rate adjustment was adopted and approximately \$303,000.00 in water fund balance was required to balance the water fund budget; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to set a new water rate structure to support the ongoing operation and maintenance of all water fund assets; and

WHEREAS, this rate will fully support the system operation maintenance, asset repair and replacement, system improvements, debt service and reserve requirements; and

WHEREAS, the new proposed retail rate schedule will generate enough revenue to finance the upcoming five-year Capital Improvement Program through a blended cash and conventional bonding approach instead of a pay as you go cash payment approach; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Auburn City Council does hereby approve a new retail quarterly water rate of \$3.35 per hundred cubic feet and a new retail monthly water rate of \$2.99 per hundred cubic feet to be effective May 1, 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the retail monthly water rate shall be increased from \$2.99 per hundred cubic feet to \$3.35 per hundred cubic feet to be effective May 1, 2023.
